# **Poppy's Posies** A Fused Art Quilt (Complete pattern and instructions enclosed)

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## **Poppy's Posies**

#### A Fused Art Quilt, Finished Size about 13" x 13" © Laura Wasilowski

#### **Materials and Tools**

15" x 15" of orange batik fabric for the 1 yard of parchment paper or backing background paper (optional) 13" x 13" batting (wool batting 10" x 7" of light blue fabric for the wall 10" x 3 1/2" of red to purple fabric for the recommended) 13" x 13" Timtex or another brand of stiff tablecloth 9" x 9" of light orange fabric for basket A interfacing (for optional Wrapped Binding) strips 9" x 9" of light green fabric for basket B 13" x 13" backing fabric strips Black Sharpie Fine Point marker 8" x 7" of red to orange fabric for Rotary cutter, mat, and ruler Decorative rotary cutter blade (pinking poppies blade recommended) 8" x 4" of yellow fabric for flower centers 7" x 7" of green fabric for stems and Size 8 or 12 embroidery thread Size 4 or 5 embroidery needle leaves 1 <sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> yards of fusible web (Wonder Under Machine quilting thread #805 recommended)

## Preparation

- 1. This quilt measures about 13" x 13" upon completion and is hand-stitched and machine quilted.
- 2. Assemble all the materials and tools listed.
- 3. Fuse all the fabrics following the manufacturer's directions.
- 4. After the fabric cools, remove all the release paper except that on the background fabric.
- 5. Save this **Silicone Release Paper**. It is needed for the construction of this quilt. Or use parchment paper in its place.
- 6. This quilt is finished with an optional Wrapped Binding using Timtex or another brand of stiff interfacing. Another type of binding can be used in place of the Wrapped Binding.

#### Wall and Tablecloth

- 1. Trim 1/4" from one long side and the 2 short sides of the wall fabric using the pinking blade in the rotary cutter.
- 2. Center the wall fabric horizontally onto the background fabric with the un-trimmed side facing down. The top edge of the wall fabric should be about 3" down from the top edge of the background fabric and 2 1/2" in from each of the sides. Fuse-tack into place.
- 3. Trim 1/4" from each edge of the tablecloth fabric using the pinking blade in the rotary cutter.
- 4. Place the tablecloth fabric horizontally across the lower edge of the wall. Overlap the tablecloth fabric about 1/4" on top of the lower edge of the wall fabric. Fuse-tack into place.

- 5. Cut the basket A strips fabric on the bias to form 2 triangles. (Cut at a 45-degree angle from the grain of the fabric or from corner to corner on a square piece of fabric.)
- 6. Cut a total of 14 bias strips measuring about 1/4" wide from the long edges of the triangles.
- 7. Cut the basket B strips fabric on the bias to form 2 triangles.
- 8. Cut a total of 20 bias strips measuring about 1/4" wide from the long edges of the triangles.
- 9. Align the 14 basket A strips vertically next to each other onto the release paper. Fuse-tack 1/2" of the top of each strip onto the paper to form the warp.
- 10. Weave the 20 basket B strips over and under horizontally through the vertical strips, fuse-tacking each horizontal strip as it is woven. After the fabric cools remove the woven collage from the paper.
- 11. Place the release paper or parchment paper on the basket pattern. Trace the pattern with the Sharpie.
- 12. Place the marker side of the release paper onto the glue side of the woven collage fabric. Fuse the paper in place for 5 7 seconds.
- 13. After the fabric cools, remove the release paper from the fabric. The ink from the pattern will transfer to the glue.
- 14. Cut out the basket shape just inside the black line.
- 15. Place the basket at an angle on the tablecloth. Fuse-tack just the bottom edge of the basket onto the tablecloth. Leave the rim of the basket un-fused so the stems can slip under the rim of the basket.
- 16. Repeat Steps 11 13 to make 5 poppies and 5 flower centers.
- 17. Place the 5 poppies on the wall and tablecloth. (Use the photo as a guide.) Slip the flower centers just under the top edge of the poppies. Fuse-tack into place.
- 18. Cut the stems and leaves fabric on the bias to form 2 triangles.
- 19. Cut a total of 5 bias strips measuring about 1/8" wide from the long edges of the triangles to form the stems.
- 20. Fuse-tack the end of a stem to the bottom edge of a poppy. Fuse and curve the stem toward the rim of the basket. Stop just before the basket rim. Snip the stem to size so it just fits under the basket rim.
- 21. Repeat Step 20 for the other 4 stems.
- 22. Fuse-tack the rim of the basket into place.
- 23. Repeat Steps 11 13 to make the 4 large leaves and 5 small leaves.
- 24. Trim 1/4" from one edge of each leaf using the pinking blade in the rotary cutter.
- 25. Place the 4 large leaves and 5 small leaves on the stems. Fuse-tack into place.

# Finishing with a Wrapped Binding

- 1. Remove the release paper from the background fabric. Center the **non-scrim** side of the batting onto the back of the quilt top. (Please note that if the background fabric is applied to the **scrim** side of the batting and fused into place, the quilt may appear rippled.) There should be about 1" of fabric hanging over the edge of the batting on each side.
- 2. Flip the batting and quilt top over holding everything in place and place it back onto the release paper.
- 3. Place a dry cloth on the quilt top and steam set the top to the batting for about 10 seconds in each spot.
- 4. After it cools, remove it from the release paper.
- 5. Add hand embroidery stitches with the size 8 or 12 pearl cotton thread and an embroidery needle.
- 6. Place the quilt top right-side down on the ironing surface. Match the Timtex shape to the batting and put in place.

- 7. At a corner, fold the quilt top fabric onto the Timtex to form a right angle. Leave a little ease at the tip of the corner to get a sharp point. Fuse-tack the fabric just at the corner.
- 8. Repeat Step 7 at each corner of the quilt.
- 9. At a corner, fold one side of the quilt top fabric onto the Timtex. Slowly pull, wrap, and fuse-tack the quilt top to the back following the edge of the Timtex. Stop about mid-way down the edge.
- 10. At that same corner, fold the other side of the quilt top fabric onto the Timtex making a sharp point at the corner. Slowly pull, wrap, and fuse-tack the quilt top to the back following the edge of the Timtex. Stop about mid-way down the edge.
- 11. Repeat Steps 9 10 around the perimeter of the quilt.
- 12. Trim about 1/2" from the perimeter of the backing fabric. Use a decorative blade in the rotary cutter if available.
- 13. Center the backing fabric, glue side down, onto the back of the quilt. Fuse-tack into place.
- 14. Steam set the back of the quilt.
- 15. Machine stitch the quilt.
- 16. Add a hanging loop to the back of the quilt.

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
